The Greenough Museum has a large collection of original documents that were found in Maley's Store. Included in the collection are these letters that belonged to Convict No. 4951 – John Fox.

In this digital age, we leave a continuous electronic trail of our travels, work, purchases, health, relationships, correspondence and more. Will future historians know everything about us?

In the past the only method of saving information was to put it on paper. Yet this fragile material is easily destroyed.

Over 9,000 men were transported to Western Australia as convicts between 1850 and 1868. Detailed documents were written and kept on the trial, imprisonment and transportation of these men.

But once they gained their freedom, they often disappeared from public record.


It is only through information garnered from scraps of paper like these that we learn more about those men.

John Fox was born in England in 1816. A butcher by trade, he was convicted at Warwick on 17th December 1856 of uttering a forged £5 note. As he had previously been convicted of defrauding the Excise, he was sentenced to 6 years imprisonment. At that time Fox was married with 2 children.

He was described as being, "5ft 6ins, brown hair, grey eyes, long visage, fresh complexion, middling stout."

Fox was transported from Portsmouth Prison to Western Australia on the *Lord Raglan*, arriving on 1st June 1858. He was then sent to the Toodyay Valley to work on the roads.

Fox received his Ticket of Leave on 21st March 1860 at Toodyay.




The town of Newcastle (name changed to Toodyay in 1911) was gazetted in 1861, and located near the convict depot that had been built 10 years earlier.

Because cash was scarce in the colony, promissory notes like these were used to pay employees.

The writer of the promissory note is possibly John Hunter King, a carter who was employed by James Drummond at his Toodyay Valley property, "Hawthornden."

Further research is required to determine to whom the note was addressed.



Mt Anderson 21st Aug 1861

Michael Clarkson leased "Mt Anderson" at Toodyay and was also Superintendent of the Toodyay Convict Hiring Station.



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
This reference letter is from James Drummond, of "Hawthornden," Toodyay Valley, where Fox worked as a general labourer and butcher.






John Cook originally worked for Drummond at Toodyay, then became manager at Drummond's property at Dandaragan.





John Fox died at Greenough on 19th October 1866 and these notes of his were stashed away in the attic at Maley's Store.

It is not known where he was buried.
